

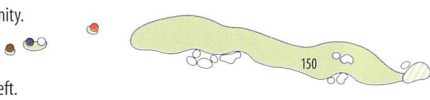
1 Sally Forth. Hit drive to left of fairway for ideal approach position. Elevated green—consider an extra half club on approach.



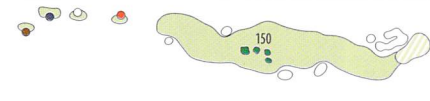
2 Treasure Chest. Short par 4. Drive to right of center. Green slopes dramatically from center to back. Approach with caution.



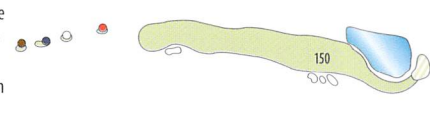
3 East Neuk. Excellent birdie opportunity. Tee shot must avoid bunkers to right when going for the green in two. Approach green from right to left.



4 Ship Shape. Tough par 4. Safe drive is to left of center, which leaves a mid to low iron approach to a very difficult putting surface.



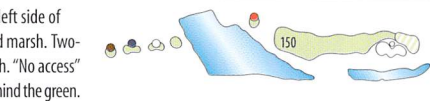
5 Forerunner. Demanding par 5. Drive left of center. Right side bunkers are trouble. Position lay-up shot so that you can reach the shallow green with your most accurate club.



6 Cattails. Tree protected tee can be misleading. Ocean winds often require an extra club or two. Short left tee shot results in severe penalty.



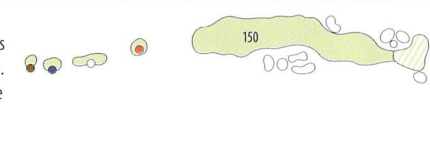
7 Breakers. Wind often a factor. Hug left side of fairway with drive to avoid rough and marsh. Two-tiered green requires precise approach. "No access" environment zone lies immediately behind the green.



8 Pinnacle Dune. Long carry across the water is required but deep green allows the use of an extra club. Short tee shots are costly.



9 Shadows. Ideal drive is to right side, adjacent to bunkers, but large mounds and rough on right can cause distress. Approach shot must carry steep slope and pot bunkers to reach the three-tiered green.



RULES OF PLAY

1. R.C.G.A. rules govern all play.
2. Water hazards: 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, 11, 14 and 16.
3. Lateral water hazard: 7
4. Out of bounds: 3 (as defined by near edge of pavement).
5. Drop areas provided across ponds on 8, 11 and 16 for regular play.
6. Sensitive Dune Habitats: these habitats, defined by roping and signage, are ground under repair from which play is prohibited. If a player's ball lies in the area, or if it interferes with the player's stance or the area of his/her intended swing, the player must take relief under rule 25-1.



Ball in Sensitive Dune Habitats:

- Water hazards: green stake/yellow tip
- Lateral water hazards: green stake/red tip
- Out of bounds: green stake/white tip

Daily pin sheets are available in the Golf Shop.

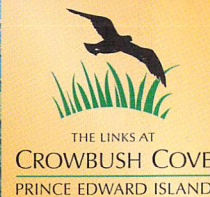
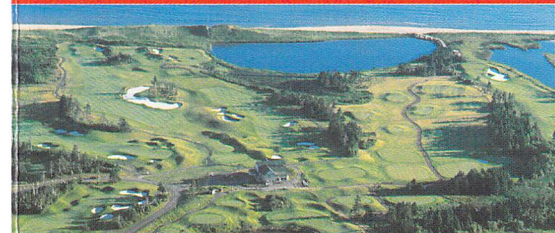

TEES:

10 **Nor Wester.** Strong drive is needed to carry fairway bunkers. Second shot can be a long iron or fairway wood to a large two-sectioned green.



11 **Sully's Run.** Unless drive reaches birch tree on right, players are advised to lay-up on second shot. Any shot across this water to the narrow green is a challenge.



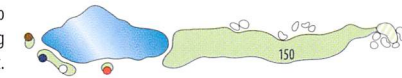
12 **Wee Toonie.** Green slopes from back to front. Play to the front. Putts from beyond the hole are very tricky.



13 **Southward Ho.** Semi-blind tee shot. Hydro pole behind green is a perfect target line. Favor right side of fairway on drive and on approach.



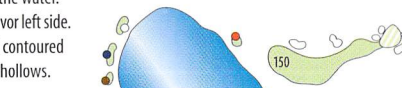
14 **Seaward Bound.** Straight solid tee shot to center of fairway is essential. If attempting green in two, left to right approach is best. If laying-up, avoid troublesome cluster of pot bunkers to left of fairway.



15 **White Sands.** Ocean winds come into play here. The ideal drive is left of center avoiding the waste bunker on right. Problems await if approach shot is too long.



16 **Heron Lookout.** Don't be intimidated by the water. An average drive should carry the pond. Favor left side. The real challenge is approaching a small contoured green surrounded by bunkers and grassy hollows.



17 **Flying Jib.** Don't take this short par 3 lightly. Favor right side of the green. Distress awaits any errant tee shot as dramatic slopes surround the green.



18 **Crow's Nest.** Solid drive will allow straight-away approach. Elevated green is well protected by mounds and bunkers. Front and rear pinning areas are bisected by a swale to make the final putt memorable.
